 - 1) Reasonable Admin Fee. p21 sates, "You cannot charge for the time taken to deal with the request" but doesn't explain why. The GDPR simply states "the controller may charge a reasonable fee based on administrative costs" surely time is one of those costs. Especially as processing of unstructured records (p60) does allow for the time to be changed based on of an hourly rate. 2) Processing large amounts of data. p23 states, "You cannot ask the requester to narrow the scope of their request". We get requests for 'all care records'. This may be multiple years worth of records, amounting to 10,000+ sides. Based on this we can't discuss what they actually need which is often significantly less. GDPR Recital 63.7 suggest we (the controller) can ask that, "the data subject specify the information", i.e. all or 6 months. If they still hold to 'all' then all are obviously provided.
